



PARTICIPATION IN THE LIFE PATTERNS RESEARCH PROJECT

INFORMATION SHEET FOR STUDENTS

Dear Student,

Your school has agreed to participate in the Life Patterns research project. The following few pages will provide you with further information about the project, so that you can decide if you would like to take part in this research.

Please take the time to read this information carefully. You may contact Dr Maire about anything you don't understand or want to know more about. Your participation is **voluntary**. If you do not wish to take part, you don't have to. If you begin participating, you can also stop at any time.

What is this research about?

This research aims to investigate how young Australians navigate work, education, relationships, and their attitudes to personal and social futures. It analyses how young people build the relationships and access the resources that enable them to manage productive trajectories through education, work and relationship formation and identifies the factors that support them in their trajectories. What will I be asked to do?

Should you agree to participate, you will be invited to complete an online survey questionnaire. The survey should take you about 20 minutes to complete. If you complete the initial survey, you will then be contacted in 2023 and in the following years to complete surveys annually. At a later date, a small group of participants may be asked to express interest in participating in an interview or a half-day workshop with other participants led by our research team. These are both voluntary activities.

What are the possible benefits?

By participating in this project, you will get a chance to reflect on your schooling and life after school. You will be sent regular reports about the group of participants that includes you and have the opportunity to learn about the experiences of other young people. At a later stage in the project, a small group of participants will be invited to attend a workshop to share ideas with other young people from around Australia. All participants will also have access to publications that compare the experiences of their generation with people who left secondary school 15 and 30 years ago. These reports will give you an understanding of your generation and of the things that contribute to resilience and wellbeing. By taking part in this project, you will also be informing policy makers and governments about the challenges and opportunities for young Australians and their attitudes to life. This information will help to ensure policies and programs for young people meet their needs.

To show our appreciation for your time and effort, if you complete the survey and are enrolled in an eligible school, you will automatically enter a draw and have **a chance to win a \$100 Coles/Myer Group gift card** (one gift card per school). In 2022, this compensation is only available to schools from New South Wales and Tasmania. For the duration of the project, gift cards will be distributed every year on a lottery basis for participants who complete the surveys.

What are the possible risks?

If you find completing the project survey stressful or experience distress, we are able to advise you on how to seek the support of a counsellor and remind you that you are free to leave the study at any stage. The project data is kept in a secure space and will be used for research purposes only.

Do I have to take part?

No. Participation is completely voluntary. You are able to withdraw at any time. You can also withdraw any data already collected from or about you.

Will I hear about the results of this project?

Yes. All participants will receive a participant report with updates from the project every year, following the waves of data collection. Participants will also be referred to the project's websites (including project progress, research report, academic publication) and other publications that communicate results from data analysis.

Academically, the project's outputs will take the form of participant and school reports, research reports; journal articles, book chapters, conference papers and keynote addresses; interviews with media; tweets and blogs; media articles and books. They will be made accessible to schools, labour market and health policy communities, and other researchers nationally and internationally via diverse platforms, such as public media, international refereed journals, publishing houses, and national and international conferences.

What will happen to my information?

The survey data will be stored in a database under password protection. All databases containing participants' personal information are de-identified and assigned an ID number at the time of their recruitment. Data is only identifiable to the Chief Investigators and Senior Research Officers. Data is only accessible to the Chief Investigators and Senior Research Officers.

The project's anonymised survey data will be deposited at the Australian Data Archive (ADA), a national data repository hosted at the Australian National University. Access to the data will be restricted to applications from researchers approved by the Life Patterns team. The survey data generated by this project will be archived in anonymised and aggregated form to be available for future ethically approved research.

Who is funding this project?

This project is funded by the Australian Research Council for five years (2021-2025).
