

Master of Educational Psychology

As only one of four educational psychology courses in the country, our highly regarded Master of Educational Psychology will prepare you to work as a registered psychologist supporting individuals with developmental and learning issues across the lifespan.

Overview

This course will provide you with training to work as a professional educational psychologist with skills in counselling, psychological assessment, research methods, intervention, group work, consultation and multidisciplinary team work. You will complete 200 points of coursework comprising nine core subjects, a minimum of 1000 hours of supervised placement in professional field settings and a 10,000 word research project.

With a focus on early childhood development, learning issues, mental health, life transitions and promoting wellbeing across the lifespan, this course provides training for educational psychology work in a wide range of settings such as early childhood centres, primary and secondary schools, tertiary institutions, health and welfare services, hospitals and clinical practices.

Outcomes

The Master of Educational Psychology qualifies you to practise as a registered psychologist and become a Member of the Australian Psychological Society and Associate Member of the College of Educational and Developmental Psychologists.

Graduates can work in:

- Schools, as a psychologist, student counsellor or welfare coordinator
- Agencies treating children with emotional and behavioural difficulties
- Government education and health departments
- Clinics, hospitals and private practices
- Universities and research units.

Entry requirements

- A four-year Australian Psychology Accreditation Council accredited degree in psychology with upper second class Honours (at least 75%), or
- An equivalent qualification in psychology with a weighted average mark of at least H2A (75%) in the final year which renders the applicant eligible for Associate Membership of the Australian Psychological Society, or
- Current registration as a psychologist with demonstrated current compliance with Registration Board continuing professional development requirements.

All applicants must also submit:

- Three academic referee reports
- A personal statement, and
- Attend an interview (if shortlisted).

All students must meet English language requirements.

Applicants with overseas qualifications must provide an Australian Psychological Society (APS) comparability assessment with their application to confirm their eligibility for Associate Membership. Visit www.psychology.org.au

Master of Educational Psychology/Doctor of Philosophy

Develop advanced research skills while studying to be an educational psychologist practitioner by completing a PhD in educational psychology.

Overview

In this combined course you will complete 100 points of coursework in the first year (or equivalent for part time students), followed by an additional 150 points throughout the final three years, along with an 80,000 word PhD thesis. You'll gain training to work as an educational psychologist with expert skills in counselling, psychological assessment, research methods, intervention, group work, consultation and multidisciplinary team work, along with advanced research skills.

With a focus on early childhood development, learning issues, mental health, life transitions and promoting wellbeing across the lifespan, you'll gain grounding in the theoretical, conceptual and empirical foundations of educational psychology. You will complete a minimum of 1000 hours of supervised placement in professional field settings, along with a substantial piece of original research within the field of practice of educational psychology.

Outcomes

The Master of Educational Psychology/Doctor of Philosophy qualifies you to practise as a registered psychologist and become a Member of the Australian Psychological Society and Associate Member of the College of Educational and Developmental Psychologists, while having completed a substantial piece of original research.

Graduates can work in a range of settings including:

- Schools, as a psychologist, student counsellor or welfare coordinator
- Agencies treating children with emotional and behavioural difficulties
- Government education and health departments
- Clinics, hospitals and private practices
- Universities and research units.
